#### WHO WROTE ROMANS?

'Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle and set apart for the gospel of God ...'

ROMANS 1.1 (NIV)



#### WHO WAS ROMANS WRITTEN TO?

Paul's greetings at the end of the letter (Romans 16) describe a close-knit and diverse community of Christians. They met in several house churches in ancient Rome.



#### WHO BROUGHT THE LETTER TO ROME?

'I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a servant of the church at Cenchreae, that you may welcome her in the Lord  $\ldots$ 

**ROMANS 16.1 2 (ESV)** 



#### WHAT'S THE UNDERLYING MESSAGE OF ROMANS?

Two main concerns pulsate through the letter: unity and mission. Paul wants to unite Jewish and Gentile Christians around the gospel so they can play their part in God's mission.



## Part II: What's wrong with religion?

IF ROMANS 1 FOCUSES ON THE PROBLEM OF UNRIGHTEOUSNESS, ROMANS 2 HIGHLIGHTS THE DANGER OF SELF-RIGHTEOUSNESS

'You, therefore, have no excuse, you who pass judgment on someone else, for at whatever point you judge another, you are condemning yourself ...'

ROMANS 2.1 (NIV)

IF WE ASSUME WE ARE BETTER THAN OTHERS, WE BECOME PROUD, CRITICAL

## Part I: God's peace is a certain fact

How does the death of Jesus put us right with God?

#### PEACE WITH GOD

'Therefore, since we have been justi ed through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ ...'
ROMANS 5.1 (NIV)



#### ACCESS TO GOD

"... through [Christ] we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand."

ROMANS 5.2 (NIV)

## Part II: God's peace is a lived experience

WE EXPERIENCE GOD'S LOVE EVEN THROUGH SUFFERING

As Christians, we won't avoid suffering but we can experience it in a different way.

'Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope ...'

ROMANS 5.3-4 (ESV)

WE EXPERIENCE GOD'S LOVE BY THE HOLY SPIRIT

We can know God loves us as a fact (Romans 5.8) and feel God's love as a personal experience.

"... God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us."

ROMANS 5.5 (NIV)



## Session 5: Freedom.

How can we avoid negative cycles?

'Offer yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life ... sin shall no longer be your master ...'

ROMANS 6.13-14 (NIV)

## Part I: Know who you are

'What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? By no means!'

ROMANS 6.1-2 (ESV)

INSTEAD, GRACE GIVES US A NEW IDENTITY SO WE CAN LIVE IN FREEDOM

'Do you not kn ow that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death? We were buried therefore with him ... in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.'

ROMANS 6.3 4 (ESV)

A Christian is united with Christ or 'in Christ'.

As Jesus died for our sin, so we have died with him: 'our old self was cruci ed with [Christ] ...'
ROMANS 6.6 (ESV)

As Jesus rose again, so we are alive in him: 'we too may live a new life.'

ROMANS 6.4 (NIV)



## Discussion time

- 1. To what extent do you know that you died with Christ and have been set free from the reign of sin? What difference does this make to your sense of identity?
- 2. In what area of your life is ghting sin hard at the moment? How can we 'count on' who we are in Christ and not give in to temptation?
- 3. Re-read verse 11 and in place of 'sin' silently hold out an area of your life (e.g. anger, greed, lust) to God.



PAUL IS PASSIONATE ABOUT HIS OWN PEOPLE. THE JEWS

'For I could wish that I myself were cursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my people ...'

In Romans 9, Paul rede nes the covenant people (Israel) according to God's purpose of election.

In Romans 11, Paul describes God's mysterious purpose to use the salvation of the Gentiles to bring many Jewish people to faith in their Messiah.

## Part II: Loving servants

**ROMANS 12.3-21** 

#### WE ARE TO BE LOVING SERVANTS IN GOD'S FAMILY

'Be devoted to one another in love' – using our gifts, offering hospitality and sharing our resources (verse 10, NIV).

WE ARE TO BE LOVING SERVANTS TOWARDS OUR ENEMIES

'Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse' (verse 14, NIV).

'Do not repay anyone evil for evil' (verse 17, NIV).

'If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink' (verse 20, NIV).

'Do not be overcome by evil but overcome evil with good' (verse 21, NIV).

## Part II: How to be a positive member of Christ's Church

GOD'S GOAL FOR THE CHURCH IS UNITY NOT UNIFORMITY

'Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God.'

ROMANS 15.7 (NIV)

WE MUST DISTINGUISH BETWEEN PRIMARY AND SECONDARY MATTERS

THOSE WITH A 'STRONG' CONSCIENCE MUST BE CONSIDERATE

'It is better not to eat meat or drink wine or to do anything else that will cause your brother or sister to fall.'

**ROMANS 14.21 (NIV)** 

#### THOSE WITH A 'WEAK' CONSCIENCE MUST ACT WITH CONVICTION

"... whoever has doubts is condemned if they eat, because their eating is not from faith; and everything that does not come from faith is sin."

ROMANS 14.23 (NIV)

#### WE MUST PROTECT OUR UNITY IN CHRIST

'Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edi cation.'

**ROMANS 14.19 (NIV)**
